

# Poynton Update and News, 8<sup>th</sup> February 2021

### Poynton Town Council precept for 2021/2022

The Town Council sets an annual precept as part of the Council Tax to help pay for the many local services we provide. This has been a particularly challenging year for the Town Council with a significant loss of income following the closure of the Civic Hall in March due to Covid restrictions. Although the Civic Hall opened to some hirers between August and December, many were unable to return because of the restrictions imposed by government.

The Council has worked hard in difficult circumstances to keep the precept low and made savings wherever possible. The Town Council's precept for 2021/22 is £491,795, an increase over the current year of £2,531, a decrease of 0.73% for a Band D home. The annual precept for a Band D home is £82.60 for the year, or £1.59 per week. We believe that this represents good value for money when measured against all the additional services in Poynton which are provided by the Town Council. These include:

- Support for the community during the Covid-19 pandemic
- Christmas tree and Christmas lights
- Hockley and Brecon Close play areas
- The majority of Lady's and Prince's Inclines
- CCTV monitoring 5 cameras in the centre of Poynton
- Graffiti removal
- Coppice Road allotments
- The Civic Hall, owned and maintained by the Town Council, is home to an increasing number of local voluntary organisations and clubs and needs maintenance and improvements. It is currently being used as a vaccine centre
- Funding for the Citizens Advice service
- Financial support for community events including Higher Poynton Summerfest and the Christmas Fest if they take place this year
- Supporting voluntary and community organisations including Poynton in Bloom, Friday Morning Shoppers and Time out Café
- The Town Council acts as Poynton's voice on many issues, including defending the Green Belt and protecting the environment
- The Town Council employs three Community Support Officers who are a visible uniformed presence in Poynton. They provide an 'eyes and ears' service aimed at reducing the fear of crime for residents and improving their quality of life. Their remit includes dealing with environmental crime issues, such as littering, fly tipping and dog fouling and reducing incidents of low level crime and antisocial behaviour.
- The Communities Co-ordinator promotes health and well-being initiatives for both older and younger people, working with voluntary groups and service providers to ensure Poynton is a strong and resilient community. Poynton is officially a dementia friendly town and it became the first Town Council in Cheshire to achieve the bronze NHS Self Care Award. Other work includes supporting the Poynton Area Community Partnership and the scheme to lend out mobility scooters and wheelchairs.
- The Operations Manager and Village Ranger have a key role working with Cheshire East, pushing for road and footpath repairs, drain clearance and lighting improvements; dealing with residents' enquiries and litter problems; supporting the Pick and Tidy group; emptying bins and similar jobs maintaining Poynton's infrastructure.

Town Councillors receive no form of salary, attendance or other allowances and give freely of their time. Poynton Town Council's website is <u>www.poyntontowncouncil.gov.uk</u>.

## Road Closure: Woodford Rd – 23<sup>rd</sup> Feb 2021

Cheshire East has informed the Town Council that they will temporarily prohibit traffic in the following length of road: Woodford Road, Poynton West and Adlington Ward, for its full extent.

They anticipate that the closure, to enable Cheshire East Highways to carry out lining works, will take place on Tuesday 23rd February 2021.

### **Census Day is coming!**

Households across Cheshire East will soon be asked CENSUS 2021 to take part in Census 2021.

The census is a once-in-a-decade survey that gives us the most accurate estimate of all the people and households in England and Wales. It has been carried out every decade since 1801, with the exception of 1941.

It will also be the first run predominantly online, with households receiving a letter with a unique access code, allowing them to complete the questionnaire on their computers, phones or tablets.

Census Day will be on Sunday 21 March, but households across the country will receive letters with online codes allowing them to take part from early March.

The census will include questions about your sex, age, work, health, education, household size and ethnicity. And, for the first time, there will be a question asking people whether they have served in the armed forces, as well as voluntary questions for those aged 16 and over on sexual orientation and gender identity.

lain Bell, deputy national statistician at the Office for National Statistics, said: "A successful census will ensure everyone from local government to charities can put services and funding in the places where they are most needed.

"This could mean things like doctors' surgeries, schools and new transport routes. That's why it is so important everyone takes part and we have made it easier for people to do so online on any device, with help and paper questionnaires for those that need them."

### Macclesfield railway maintenance - March 2021

Network Rail have informed us about a new investment programme to maintain railway tracks in the Hope Green area. The work involves renewing the stone (ballast) beneath the railway tracks and will help to keep trains running safely and reliably for passengers. They have written to residents who live near the worksite as overnight work will take place in March this year. A copy of the letter can be found here.

### Cheshire East lifts time restrictions on bus pass users

Cheshire East Council has lifted timing restrictions on travel for holders of concessionary bus passes. The move is to help support the Covid-19 vaccine roll out for elderly people and disabled residents. From 21 January, all English national travel concessionary bus pass holders are allowed to travel free of charge before 9.30am each day. All bus operators have been told about the change and asked to inform their staff.

In line with government guidance, all residents need to reduce non-essential travel as much as possible to reduce the spread of Covid-19 and save lives. If you do travel by public transport, it is a legal requirement to wear a face covering. Think: hands, face, space. #### **Dog Fouling - Hazelbadge Road**

The CCST has received several reports of dog fouling on pavements in the area of Hazelbadge Road in Poynton. The team have been out delivering leaflets to local residents in the area appealing for witnesses to these incidents.

The CCST say, "Any information leading to the identity of the offending owner(s) will be treated in strict confidence. It is an offence to allow your dog to foul a public highway for which you may receive an on the spot fine of £100".

There is strong evidence that Domestic Abuse occurs within this group, especially with carers who are supporting their loved ones living with dementia, but it can often go unrecognised.
